Dunja Chamberlain has gained for the last 25 years a great international educational experience, in Taiwan, Korea, Indonesia and Switzerland. She is currently Head of Curriculum and Vice Principal of Middle School at the International School of Geneva in Switzerland where she runs a detailed analysis of the implementation of CLIL in subject classes (science, humanities, L1 English) and the implications of teaching Science in L2. Through her work with the ECML Graz Group, she has been doing extensive research on CLIL, pluriliteracies and the role of language across the curriculum.
